The Purpose of the Role

The Comparative Medicine Unit (CMU) in Trinity College Dublin (TCD) seeks applications for the role of Chief Technical Officer 1 (CTO1). This is an important and dynamic role whose primary function is to provide effective technical and operational management of the unit as it strives to deliver the best possible service and the highest standards of animal care for its users. As line manager for the technical and laboratory attendant staff, the postholder has a key role in ensuring the implementation of university safety policies within the unit and must have strong interpersonal skills, technical knowledge and understanding. The successful applicant will be required to assume the role of Animal Care & Welfare Officer (ACWO). In this capacity s/he will be responsible for overseeing the care and welfare of the animals in the establishment and will be an active member of the Animal Welfare Body (AWB) and Animal Research Ethics Committee (AREC). The CTO1 role requires an individual who is committed to overseeing day-to-day technical matters while furthering the longer-term objectives of the unit. The postholder is a key figure in ensuring that the CMU acts responsibly to embrace the complexities of modern biomedical research and the changing legislative environment, and consistently works at the forefront of best practice in terms of animal husbandry and care.

Context

The CMU is the central animal services unit in TCD. It is registered and approved under EU and National legislation (SI 543 of 2012) by the Competent Authority, which under directive 2010/63/EU is the Health Products Regulatory Authority (HPRA) in Ireland. It provides a comprehensive research service to all approved researchers who use animals or animal products. CMU staff operate within several physical locations across the University to support ground-breaking biological and medical research in areas such as Biochemistry, Immunology and Genetics. The successful applicant will work as part of the management team, which together with the Technical Officers, Laboratory Attendants and Veterinarians form this vibrant and dynamic unit.

Main Responsibilities

This is a (non-exhaustive) list of the tasks, duties, and responsibilities of the role.

Human Resource Management

The CTO1 will

- act as line manager of technical and laboratory attendant staff. This will involve hands-on and technical leadership, leading by example, distributing workloads and organizing staff meetings and developing strong professional, cooperative relationships to ensure the effective operation of the unit.
- supervise technical and laboratory attendant staff including work schedule planning, work distribution, communication, team working and promote the continued professional development of staff.
- assist with the hiring and training of new technical and laboratory attendant staff, undertake performance evaluations, and perform routine inspections of work performed by the staff reporting to them.

Facility Resource Management

The CTO1 will

- monitor the unit including environmental parameters related to legislative requirements, and facility operations for reporting and audit purposes.
- provide managerial and technical support for the efficient breeding of rodents (including mutant, wild type, and transgenic colonies). Supervise, oversee, and maintain animal records and manage animal orders.
- authorise and control expenditure on technical services, supplies and support staff; manage inventories and stores.
- assist with managing the budget including the preparation of financial documentation for planning purposes.

Information Resource Management

- The CTO1 may be required to serve as the information officer relating to animal use and welfare for TCD. With the support of the Animal Welfare Body (AWB), the information officer prepares and distributes a monthly electronic newsletter to all users of the facility to keep them abreast of the developments in laboratory animal science.
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Quality Management

The CTO1 will

- operate a Quality Management Program in CMU, focusing on customer satisfaction and benefits to all members of CMU, the university's animal research community and to society.
- develop institutional animal care-and-use policies, programmes, and standard operating procedures to comply with regulations, policies, and nationally accepted standards.

Education and Training Management

The CTO1 may be required to act as the establishment training officer.

- The establishment training officer is responsible for the education and training of staff and is expected to ensure that systems are in place to verify that the personnel working with animals are trained to the necessary standards and supervised until they have demonstrated the requisite competence. The training officer participates in the organization of training events, and trains and mentors the CMU technical and laboratory attendant staff in support of their continuous professional development.

Regulatory Compliance

The CTO1 will

- serve as the Animal Care and Welfare Officer (ACWO) in TCD responsible for overseeing the welfare and care of the animals in the establishment.
 - be an active and engaged member of Animal Welfare Body (AWB), Animal Research Ethics Committee (AREC) and CMU Executive Committee. As a member of these committees the individual will support the mission and operation of the unit by participating in working groups, facilitating inspections of the animal facility by members of the AWB, reviewing and advising on animal use protocols and reporting on operational matters as part of the senior management team.
 - actively participate in regulatory inspections, in the preparation of reports to governmental and accreditation agencies and be cognizant at all times of the need for compliance with legislative requirements, policies, and national/European standards.
 - engage with the College's Estates and Facilities Office to maintain and monitor environmental conditions.
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Safety Management

- The CTO1 will contribute to and support the implementation of university safety policy in the unit.

Public Affairs

- The CTO1 will support the CMU Director in responding to inquiries, problems, and concerns from faculty, staff, students, the public and regulatory agencies regarding the care and use of vertebrate animals for research, testing or teaching at Trinity College Dublin.
- The CTO1 will support the CMU Director in managing Freedom of Information (FOI) requests.

Other

- Such other activities related to the management and organisation of unit resources as required.
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Person Requirements

The postholder will require the following knowledge, skills, and attributes for successful performance in the role.

Qualifications

Essential

- **From 1 January 2007 onwards:** New entrants to the Irish public sector must have an honours degree. In addition, they should have a MSc qualification or equivalent postgraduate qualification, preferably in a relevant biological or veterinary discipline, or a minimum of Institute of Animal Technology (IAT) level 6.
- **Before 1 January 2007:** Current Irish public sector employees must have a national certificate in Science and Health (i.e. a higher education qualification in a Science and Health discipline offered by an Institute of Technology or HETAC-designated institution in Ireland) and substantial experiential learning in an academic/technical environment.
- The minimum entry point will be the 1st point of the Chief Technical Officer 1 scale. Candidates should note that a different starting salary may apply if, immediately prior to appointment, the successful candidate is a serving public or civil servant.

Desirable

- Further qualification in laboratory animal science/medicine, animal care and welfare.
- Fellow of the Institute of Animal Technology

Knowledge & Experience

Applicants must have a minimum of three years' demonstrable relevant experience working in a similar position managing a technical facility and an understanding of the organisation and planning related to same, ideally in a university teaching and/or research environment. Applicants must also have experience of staff management and proven ability to make decisions and manage people and situations effectively.

Candidates for this post should have:

Essential

- Experience of direct supervision and training of technical staff and/or laboratory attendant staff.
- At least three years proven experience of organising the day-to-day operation of a technical facility.
- Direct hands-on experience of breeding and maintenance of laboratory rodents including transgenics and mutant strains.
- Direct experience of welfare and husbandry including caging and housing needs, environmental monitoring and enrichment opportunities, nutritional, physiological and biological requirements.
- An understanding of the design of animal experiments and the application of the 3Rs (reduction, refinement and replacement).
- An understanding of the legislation, regulations, ethics and accepted standards relating to laboratory animal use and the ability to advise and communicate these with others.
- Understanding of data protection and working within a confidential data environment.
- Understanding of animal anatomy and physiology.
- Understanding of rodent anaesthesia and analgesia and basic animal procedures such as blood sampling, injections and cannulations.
- A working knowledge of pre- and post-operative care of common laboratory species.
- Recognising variance from normal animal health and behaviour, adverse effects, and humane end points in animals under their care.
- Ability to perform euthanasia using the methods approved and authorised.

Desirable

- Experience of working in an academic environment.
- Experience in implementing health and safety policy and procedures in an academic or industrial environment.
- Experience of working in a barrier specific pathogen free (SPF) unit.

Skills & Competencies

- The successful applicant will support the designated veterinarian and management team in training and mentoring a team of technicians and laboratory attendants, excellent interpersonal communication skills are essential.
- Ability to mentor staff using a supportive and collaborative approach: assign accountabilities; set objectives; establish priorities; and monitor and evaluate results.
- Ability to manage operations and personnel efficiently; to recruit, train, motivate and retain staff.
- Ability to manage workloads and adhere to deadlines.
- Ability to work within internal organizational structures and procedures in a manner that is cognizant of external legislative requirements and responsive to the needs of the unit.
- Excellent numeracy and I.T. skills including budget preparation and management tools: MS Office, Databases, web-based engagement, Building Management System.
- Excellent oral, written and communication skills.
- Ability to facilitate constructive and progressive organisational change and recognise opportunities to improve current practices and processes.
- Strong commitment to the promotion of animal welfare in research.
- Ability to inspire others to work at their best and to promote a culture of care amongst staff.

Personal attributes

- Proven ability to work in a professional and confidential manner that is alert to the needs of an active research environment and responsive to the requirements of external regulatory authorities.
- Ability to use judgment, think strategically, analyse logically and cogently and persuasively present summaries and recommendations.
- Highly motivated individual with strong technical and organisational skills.

- Ability to work effectively both independently and as a member of a team.
- Possess excellent communication, negotiation and interpersonal skills within a team with diverse levels of expertise.
- Pro-active with a flexible and collaborative approach to their work.
- Conscientious with attention to detail.
- Promote a culture of high performance and commitment to consistent high standards.
- Self-reliant, good problem solver and goal oriented.

Trinity Competencies

In Trinity there are 6 Core Competencies that are applicable to all roles across a range of professional, administrative and support jobs, unlike specialist or technical skills which may be job specific. They provide a common language for describing performance and the abilities/attributes displayed by individuals. They focus on 'how' tasks are achieved, not 'what' is achieved.

Application Information

To assist the selection process, candidates should submit a full Curriculum Vitae (with contact details (email) of three referees) and a Cover Letter (2 x A4 pages) that specifically address the requirements of the post and the following in particular.

1. Candidates must have at least 3 years of experience of working with laboratory rodents and organising the day-to-day operation of an animal research facility. This may have involved oversight of laboratory animal care and welfare. Applicants should outline their knowledge and experience to date.
2. An understanding of the ethical principles, European regulations, legislation and accepted standards as they apply to the use of animals for research is essential. The applicant should indicate their level of knowledge, how they obtained this, and any experience acquired to date in regulatory affairs.
3. An understanding/direct experience of breeding laboratory rodents is essential. Applicants should outline their level of knowledge and experience and indicate how they acquired this.
